Empowering Invisible Youth: The G1000 i-YES Project

*Across Europe, many young people remain unseen and unheard, particularly those **not in education, employment, or training (NEETs)**. These "invisible" youth, often from marginalised backgrounds, face numerous barriers to social and economic inclusion.*

MY PEACE is inspired by projects that already work to engage young people, especially those that feel marginalised. The G1000 i-YES Project, initiated by the Roma Education Fund, aims to address these challenges by providing a platform for youth engagement, professional development, and cultural expression.

The importance of this initiative cannot be overstated. By bridging the gap between young people and decision-makers, the project fosters active participation in democratic processes, enhances educational and professional opportunities, and empowers youth to shape their own futures. Understanding and supporting such efforts is crucial in building an inclusive, equitable society where all individuals, regardless of background, can thrive.



Topic

The G1000 i-YES Project is a two-year initiative designed to improve the representation of marginalised youth in European policy discussions. The project specifically focuses on NEETs from underprivileged neighbourhoods affected by poverty, unemployment, school dropout, and inter-religious conflicts.

Through a series of participatory education activities, expert meetings, workshops, and a youth summit, the project seeks to amplify young people's voices in decision-making. By integrating non-formal education, mobility programs, and professionalisation, G1000 i-YES ensures that these youth are not just passive recipients of aid but active contributors to society. Outline of Research + Implementation Team

The G1000 i-YES Project was implemented by the Roma Education Fund in collaboration with five European partners. It was part of the European Youth Together Initiative and began on March 1, 2022. The project was conducted in Belgium, France, Italy, and Romania, specifically targeting areas with high levels of poverty and exclusion.

The research methodology employed was innovative and inclusive, combining non-formal education, mobility discovery, professionalisation, and active youth engagement. Cultural operators, musicians, social organisations, and researchers contributed their expertise to promote marginalised cultures and provide young participants with professional and personal development opportunities.

Impact

The G1000 i-YES Project has made significant strides in empowering youth and fostering inclusion. It has led to the creation of a European network that supports and promotes "invisible" social groups, as well as the development of a Good Practice Guide showcasing effective European initiatives in youth empowerment. The project has mobilised cultural experts and social organisations to share knowledge and promote marginalised cultures while also empowering youth through cultural identity and public speaking training.

Additionally, it has engaged young participants in critical discussions, debates, and artistic expression, fostering a sense of agency and belonging among those who have historically been excluded from mainstream discourse. By addressing the lack of visibility and representation of marginalised youth, the G1000 i-YES Project paves the way for a more inclusive and democratic Europe. It fosters social cohesion by ensuring that young people, regardless of their socioeconomic status, have the opportunity to participate, contribute, and be heard. The project ultimately serves as a model for youth engagement, professionalisation, and active civic participation across the EU.

GERMANY



National Action Plan Against Racism: A Commitment to Equality

*Racism and discrimination threaten the fabric of democratic societies, undermining human rights, social cohesion, and equality. Recognising these dangers, the **German government has implemented the National Action Plan Against Racism (NAP)** as a comprehensive strategy to counter prejudice, discrimination, and hate crime.*

This initiative underscores the state's commitment to upholding human dignity, as enshrined in the German Basic Law. Understanding and addressing racism is crucial, especially in today's polarizing global climate. Migrants, asylum seekers, and marginalised communities often face systemic discrimination, creating barriers to integration, employment, and social participation. The NAP aims to dismantle these barriers and create an inclusive society where every individual is treated with respect and fairness. This is also an objective of the MY PEACE Project.



Topic

The National Action Plan Against Racism is a governmental initiative designed to combat racial discrimination, right-wing extremism, and other forms of exclusion. It aligns with Germany's commitment to international human rights and the prohibition of racial discrimination, as defined by global legal frameworks. The plan targets racism, antisemitism, Islamophobia, anti-Roma sentiment, homophobia, and transphobia, reinforcing the need for a pluralistic society.

One of the key goals of the NAP is to strengthen civil society and promote democratic values, ensuring that racism and discrimination are actively opposed at all levels. It also addresses hate crimes, many of which remain unreported. As part of the initiative, Germany has conducted victimisation surveys to gather data on hate crimes, enabling authorities to take informed actions against racially motivated violence. Outline of Research + Implementation Team

The implementation of the National Action Plan Against Racism is spearheaded by the German Federal Government, particularly under the guidance of the Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women, and Youth (BMFSFJ). The Interministerial Working Group on the Promotion of Democracy and Prevention of Extremism (IMA) has played a crucial role in identifying key areas of action for the NAP. An empirical review of the initiative was conducted by the Institute for Interdisciplinary Research on Conflict and Violence (Bielefeld University).

The research focused on evaluating hate crimes, discrimination patterns, and the effectiveness of democratic participation in addressing racism. Additionally, the strategy aligns with the Federal Government's "Strategy for the Prevention of Extremism and the Promotion of Democracy", introduced in July 2016.

Impact

The National Action Plan Against Racism has far-reaching implications for migrants, ethnic minorities, and marginalized groups in Germany. By implementing policies that address discrimination in housing, employment, and social participation, the NAP aims to ensure equal opportunities for all. A significant aspect of the plan includes the "Live Democracy!" program, which actively funds initiatives against right-wing extremism, violence, and misanthropy. For the first time, funding has also been allocated to combat homophobia and trans hostility, marking a progressive step in anti-discrimination efforts.

However, challenges remain. The categorization of certain nations such as Morocco, Algeria, and Tunisia as "safe countries of origin" contradicts human rights reports and raises concerns about the fair treatment of asylum seekers. The NAP seeks to address such contradictions and advocate for policies that genuinely reflect Germany's commitment to human rights. Ultimately, the goal of the NAP is to create a more inclusive society where racism, prejudice, and discrimination are actively challenged. By continuously evaluating and improving anti-racism measures, Germany sets an example for other nations striving to uphold human dignity and equality.

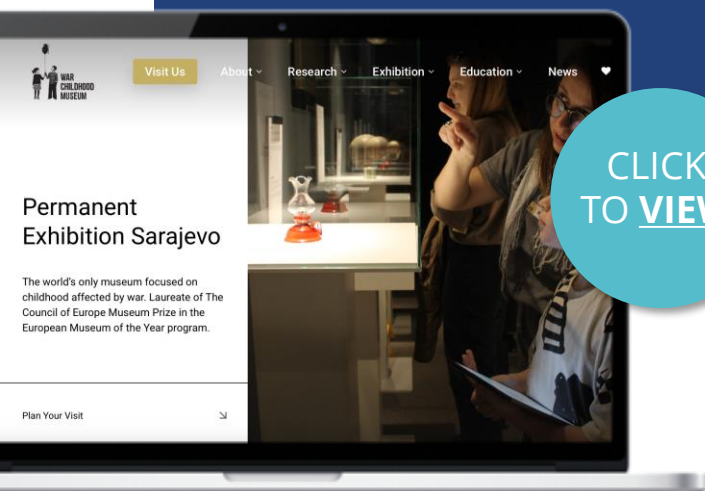
War Childhood Museum:

Preserving Memories, Promoting Peace

*The **experiences of children in war** often go unheard, yet their stories are crucial for understanding the human cost of conflict. The **War Childhood Museum (WCM)**, based in Sarajevo, provides a unique perspective on the lives of children affected by war.*

By collecting personal artefacts, stories, and testimonies, this museum ensures that their experiences are not forgotten. This topic is important because childhood is a fundamental phase of human development, and conflict leaves lasting scars.

Understanding these impacts can guide peacebuilding efforts, influence policymaking, and promote social healing. The museum's work applies to various sectors, including education, history, humanitarian work, and psychological support services.

Topic

The War Childhood Museum is dedicated to documenting and sharing the experiences of children who have lived through war. Founded in 2017, it serves as an educational and emotional space where visitors can engage with these narratives through immersive exhibits, storytelling, and music. Music plays a key role in the museum's approach, helping to evoke empathy and facilitate emotional healing.

The topic matters because war's effects on children extend far beyond the battlefield. Trauma, displacement, and loss shape their futures and, by extension, the societies they grow into. By shedding light on their stories, the museum fosters understanding and helps prevent the same mistakes from repeating in future generations. It also provides a safe space for children affected by war to express themselves, which is essential for their psychological well-being.

Outline of Research + Implementation Team

The War Childhood Museum Foundation leads this project, bringing together historians, educators, psychologists, and artists. Their efforts focus on collecting testimonies, curating exhibits, and organising workshops.

The museum has received international recognition, including the Council of Europe Museum Prize (2018), highlighting its global impact. The foundation also collaborates with peacebuilding organisations, policymakers, and educators to integrate these stories into educational curricula and discussions about war and its consequences.

Impact

The work of the War Childhood Museum has a profound impact on individuals, communities, and society at large. One of its key contributions is preserving historical narratives. By collecting thousands of artifacts and stories, the museum ensures that the experiences of war-affected children are not erased from history. Another significant impact is fostering empathy and dialogue. Interactive exhibits help visitors, including policymakers and educators, understand the deep emotional and psychological scars of war on children. Additionally, the museum provides emotional healing through its workshops, allowing children to express their experiences through art and music, helping them process trauma and find a sense of closure. Lastly, the museum plays a role in advancing peacebuilding efforts. By highlighting the resilience of children in conflict, it contributes to global conversations on peace and conflict resolution.

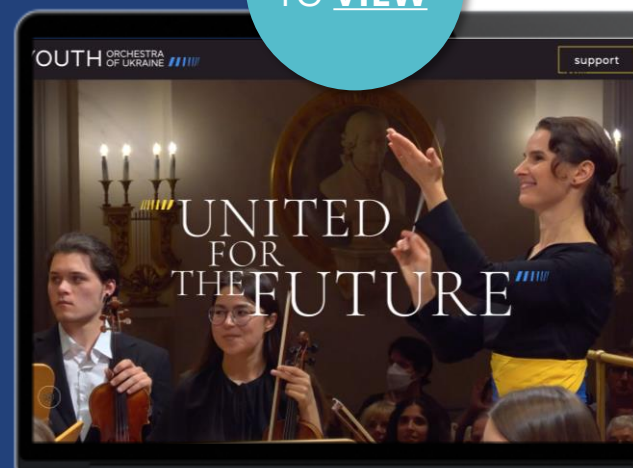
The Power of Music: How the Youth Symphony Orchestra of Ukraine is the Future of Classical Music

YSOU has gained recognition for its commitment to excellence, offering its participants opportunities such as rehearsal camps, concert tours, master classes, and chamber music projects. These activities enhance not just their technical skills but also their adaptability and cultural awareness. By collaborating with international institutions, YSOU ensures that Ukrainian talent is nurtured and acknowledged worldwide.

Who is Working on This Initiative?

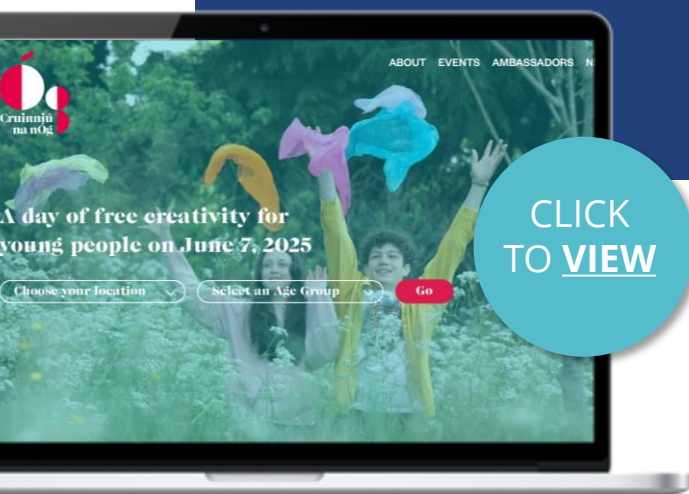
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IRELAND

Bridging Cultures Through Music: The Impact of GLOMUS on Global Artistic Collaboration

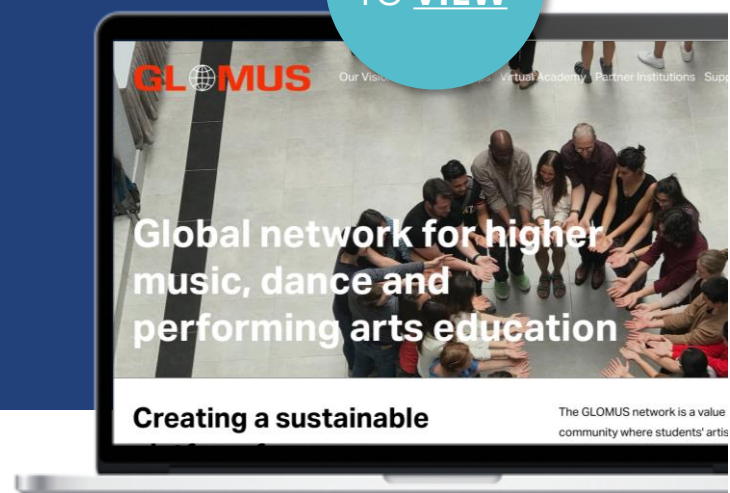
In a world that is increasingly interconnected, cultural exchange and artistic collaboration play a crucial role in fostering understanding and unity.

Established 15 years ago, it is primarily a Nordic initiative but has expanded significantly, encompassing participants from over 35 countries. The network focuses on artistic and personal growth, placing emphasis on intercultural dialogue and creative collaboration.

This initiative is significant because it provides a platform where young artists can explore cultural diversity and use their art as a means to address global issues. The GLOMUS network promotes creativity as a tool for dialogue and social change, making it an important contributor to global cultural development. Who is Working on This Initiative?

GLOMUS is implemented and promoted by The Royal Academy of Music and The Danish National School of Performing Arts. These institutions have led the initiative by organizing various projects and events that encourage artistic exchange.

One of the most significant projects is the GLOMUS Camp, an event that brings together students, educators, and artists from around the world to participate in performances, debates, and creative workshops. A recent example is the 2022 GLOMUS Camp in Aarhus, Denmark, where around 200 students and educators from music and performing arts institutions participated in artistic collaborations and discussions about global issues. Themed “GLOBAL OPTIMISM”, this camp explored the ways in which young artists interpret cultural, political, and human challenges in a post-pandemic world. Additionally, GLOMUS has conducted local artistic engagements, allowing local communities to interact directly with visiting artists. These community-driven initiatives highlight the network’s commitment to making a real-world impact beyond just academic discussions

INTERNATIONAL EUROPEAN UNIVERSITY

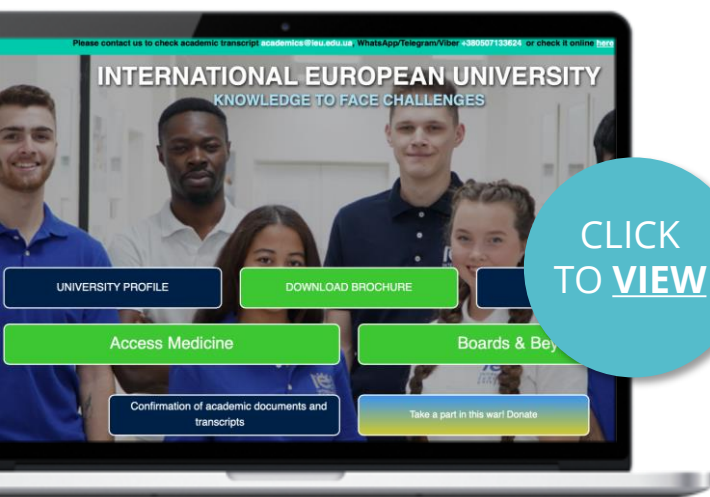
